Deconfirmed information received is that this convention will be held at the Rucker Temple, 1812 Lynch Street, Jackson, Mississippi. The location of this convention, which is expected to have 25 to 40 in attendance, will be confirmed.

As of March 29, 1973, RICHARD KERRY, aka BUCKNER THOMAS BUCKNER, Chairman, I. President, remains in jail awaiting approval of bond by Federal Judge.
